

While every April is Earth Month, at the City of Tallahassee, we strive every day to integrate sustainability into all that we do. The City continues to lead the region in transitioning its buses and light-duty fleet to low- and zero-emission vehicles, investing in infrastructure and expanding recreational opportunities, while providing best-in-class service. From broad initiatives like the Clean Energy Plan to individually tailored efforts like residential energy audits, the City works to care for the people and places that make Tallahassee such a great place to live, work and play.

Below are five actions you can implement to reduce your impact on our environment and conserve natural resources.

- Insulate your home by sealing gaps around windows and doors and ensuring proper ceiling insulation.
- Repair water leaks quickly. A hot water leak is especially important to fix as it also wastes eneargy.
- Set your thermostat wisely. The smaller the difference between the outdoor and indoor temperature, the less your cooling/heating system needs to work.
- Divert waste from the landfill by composting food scraps; recycling paper, plastic, glass and metal; and donating, repurposing or re-homing gently used items.
- Walk, bike, carpool or use public transportation whenever possible.

CONNECT WITH HISTORY AT THE JOHN G. RILEY CENTER/MUSEUM



The second of a four-part, four-year exhibition series that depicts the lives of Blacks in Tallahassee from the Antebellum Period to the Civil Rights Era is now open at the John G. Riley Center/Museum for

African American History & Culture.

"African Americans in Tallahassee: The Civil War and Reconstruction Era" is the theme of the multifaceted show that runs through the end of 2025. The exhibition offers "a comprehensive narrative of resistance, resilience and success against all odds," said Riley Museum executive director Aron L. Myers, Ph.D.

The exhibit begins in the museum's Visitor Center,

with Tallahassee during the Civil War Era, and ends in the historic Riley House next door. It examines what life was like for newly freed African Americans in Tallahassee, profiles Civil War era pioneers who persevered despite unimaginable hurdles and shines a light on the life and legacy of John G. Riley, the museum's namesake.
